"Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, fear not; say to the cities of Judah,

Please join us for a very special worship service on October 25. We will have the director of Dismas House and some of its residents sharing the good news of that program. The Outreach ministry team is hoping to make a substantial contribution to Dismas from the Sibley Fund and the sermon that day will help lay the groundwork for the congregation's education. The congregation will be asked to gather for a special meeting for that discussion late this fall.

Dismas House was named for the Good Thief crucified with Jesus, who asked for forgiveness and was granted paradise. The mission of Dismas is the reconciliation of homeless, former prisoners and society through the creation of supportive communities. Dismas House welcomed its first residents in 1988, and since then has helped hundreds of former prisoners reconcile with society. Dismas provides a range of effective services, from the emergency (food, shelter, and clothing), to the longer term (civil legal assistance, recovery services for drugs and alcohol, and employment and housing). Most importantly, what sets Dismas aside is the small-scale family environment. The staff and volunteers strive to make Dismas a family by incorporating sit-down dinners prepared in the Dismas kitchen by residents and volunteers from area churches, families with dogs, and area students. There is no "sign" outside our door that says, "Dismas, home for ex-prisoners." Instead, it is a family home like any other family in the community, working through issues together, struggling over the long term to create an organization in which interpersonal relationships are the foundation of our success, where former prisoners feel welcome, and thus "buy into" the Dismas mission of reconciliation.

In its twenty plus years, Dismas has been fortunate to open the doors to new homes. Specifically, Dismas opened the doors to Almost Home in 2006, and the Father John Brooks House in 2007. At Almost Home, 12 parolees participated every four months in a rigorous morning-to-night reentry program set in a Dismas-style home. At Brooks House, graduates of Dismas and other homeless folks live in their own apartments or shared apartments in exchange for sobriety, employment, and fees for the upkeep of the building. Due to economic setbacks at the state level, Almost Home was forced to close its doors on July 1, 2009. Dismas has been diligently pursuing a new program, the Dismas Farm, for the past year and half, and this project will now serve as a replacement for Almost Home. The Dismas Farm will remove from the inner city homeless former prisoners, house them at the farm, and they will participate in upkeep of a working vegetable and wool farm, as well as recovering from drugs and moving towards a sustainable lifestyle. Churches will enrich the spiritual and social needs of the residents, all the while preserving a 10 acre working farm in rural central Massachusetts.

Dave McMahon has been the co-Executive Director of Dismas house for the past 12 years. A graduate of the University of Notre Dame, and a former fellow in non-profit management at the Kennedy School of Government Hauser Center, Dave is convinced that with the right community support, people in need released from our jails can be a success for themselves and our communities.

## Visions and Dreams Reflections from your Interim Pastor, The Reverend Mark Seifried

I will pour out my Spirit on every kind of people: your sons will prophecy, also your daughters; Your young men will see visions, your old men shall dream dreams ...
I'll pour out my Spirit on those who serve me, men and women both ...
And whoever calls out for help to me, God, will be saved.
(Excerpts are from Acts 2:17-21. Translation is from *The Message* by Eugene Peterson.)

The above passage comes from Peter's speech to the gathered assembly in Jerusalem at Pentecost, the day the Holy Spirit birthed the church of Jesus Christ. To me, this is one of the most significant passages for church - going Christians because it contains the promise that *all* who serve God will be filled with the Holy Spirit. Do *you* believe that? I wonder.

Our spiritual memory doesn't go back very far. Some know we were the church of the Pilgrims, Puritans, and Congregationalists but few really claim their religious heritage came from Jerusalem - where Jesus was crucified and resurrected and where the church was born. We need to remember these events and the gifts that came with them just as surely as we remember our place in Auburn's history ... Actually, we could forego some of our memory of American heritage so we can make "Christian" our first level of association. If we could do that, perhaps we could be more open to the work of the Holy Spirit. If we could do that, perhaps we could experience a rebirth with the vim and vigor of Pentecost.

I am convinced that unless members of the church claim the gifts of the Spirit that we will slumber in spiritual lethargy. Those gifts as proclaimed by the apostle Paul are sharing spiritual wisdom, spiritual knowledge, spiritual faith, spiritual healing, working miracles, prophecy, discernment of spirits, speaking and interpreting tongues. Until men and women use those gifts of the Spirit, dream the dreams of God, and envision a future built by God we will be mired in spiritual muck.

The late Henri Nouwen said, "You are Christian only so long as you constantly pose critical questions to the society you live in ... so long as you stay unsatisfied with the status quo and keep saying that a new world is yet to come."

Perhaps the church has become too comfortable to question the status quo. Perhaps we are emblematic of the status quo. Or, perhaps we have lost the faith to say, "A new world is yet to come." I wonder.

I say all this not to claim that we are doing things wrong in the church, but to say we need to reclaim that which has been our Christian birthright. We need to pray about the church and for the church so that we can talk about the visions and dreams for the church that God reveals to us. It is in listening for God's word to us that the dreams and visions come. It is in hearing God's word that we understand just how we are caught up in the status quo. It is then that we understand just how much we need to proclaim and act toward a new world that is yet to come ... a world built upon Christ's peace, love and mercy.

**Note:** I will be offering six sessions on Tuesday evenings at 7:00 and Friday mornings at 10:00, beginning October 13 and October 16, so that we might practice being a spiritual community together. We will use different practices of prayer ranging from Centering Prayer to Lectio Divina, where scriptures guide the meditations of our hearts. During each session, we will have a time of discussion on how the Holy Spirit is speaking to us about our personal and communal lives. Please let me know (phone call, email, or verbally) of your interest in advance so that I can have materials prepared for all participants.

Let's keep imagining the new world God is preparing for us and let's pray about our role in birthing it. Let us call out for help from God ... and be saved.

#### Here We Grow Preschool

Here We Grow Preschool

#### LEDGER

#### 1773-1786

A few years ago I read and copied a ledger that was stored in the town hall basement. I don't believe this book has been read in the last two hundred years. It is a complete record of the step-by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town.

The following is just one of a series of excerpts from these writings.

George DuHamel and Paula Lubin, Church Historians

At a meeting of the Inhabitants of the South Parish in Worcester & Towns ajasent healed the 12 day of January 1778.


- Art. 1 Chose Mr. Charles Richardson moderator for S'd meeting.
- Art. 2 Voted that Mr. Peeter hardy be added to the Commetty appointed in behalf of the Parish to petition the General Court for our incorporation into a Township & that S'd Commetty be Directed to attend on the General Court Commetty appointed to Establish Boundaries in all manner in behalf of S'd Parish, also voted that mr. Jacob Stephens provide for the Court Commetty.
- Art. 3 Voted to conferm the Pew No. 35 to Mr. Oliver Curtice in Lue of a Pew No. 56 which is Revirt back to the parish.
- Art. 4 Voted that those persons Named on a plan of the enfide of the meetinghouse in the Parish Book Register as living owners of Pew ground in S'd House an their substitutes shall be still & ever intilled to S'd Parish in the order & rank of the prises on S'd Plat set fourth provided they shall Compromise with Mr. Carter the undertaker for the work to mak him pay Equally Good to the current value of money at the Pay he undertuck S'd work and Such of the S'd owners as shall neglect to agree & compound afore S'd within 2 weeks from this Pay shall by the Parish be considered as havin to all intents & purposes forfeited aney further pretentions to S'd Pew spots and S'd pew spots shall Revert to the Parish & they be com Responsible to Mr. Carter on the terms above. Respecting pay.
- Art. 5 Voted this article pass over as being Superceeded in or by the 2 article.

#### **Library Tidings** by Gloria Whitehead

One Small Candle - the Pilgrims' First Year in America by Thomas J. Fleming. While straightening fiction books in the adult library the aforementioned title initiated a second look. Though a portion of this book also appeared under the same title in the December 1963 Reader's Digest, time could not have altered its historic contents too much. The tales of the trials and tribulations of two extreme cultures are only a portion of Fleming's skill in portraying the unique achievements of the Pilgrims, their separation of church and state, etc. and their warmth mixed with occasional humor. It concludes with the first Thanksgiving and William Bradford's progressive words, "As one small candle may light a thousand so the light kindled here has shone unto many . . . "

Could a revisit to this historical period add a meaningful portion of history to your pumpkin pie or light a few memorable Thanksgiving candles for you? It's only October so *One Small Candle* should be able to be "lit" (borrowed) by several families.

The children's library holds a wealth of Bibles for children of all ages. At some point (and if we fail to follow through be SURE to remind us) we'll make a list of these Bibles with close age appropriate notations. The two newest additions (which are beautiful hardcovers) are:

- 1. The *Flap and Tab Bible* is designed to meet the specific needs of preschoolers by providing flaps for interactive learning and hand-eye coordination, tabs to build early reference skills, sturdy pages to help increase small-muscle control and 15 stories to expand Bible knowledge. The flap, once lifted, reveals a picture and the tabs indicate the subject matter in a section.
- 2. On My Own Reader Bible consists of 75 stories based on the New Living Translation which is just right for beginning readers. The specific needs that are emphasized are: layout that supports reading skill-building, large print and white space between lines, appropriate story length for primary-grade learners, 75 Bible stories selected with new readers in mind.

Another in the *Mystery and the Minister's Wife* series entitled *How the Heart Runs* by Anne Marie Rodgers has been gifted by Gloria Beauregard. This series is expanding in popularity as it's easy reading and can be a "stop and start" delight. Each volume has its own identity - no waiting for the return of the previous volume.

As you look at our church altar, focus on the quilt square that is placed on center from the altar cloth. Remember how it was dedicated at some time during the summer? Since that time a spiral bound book has been placed in the adult library and its title is, *Immerse Yourself in Prayer*. Open the book to quilts #7 & #8. Quilt #7 is the prayer that accompanied the quilt our ladies made, Quilt #8 is the prayer that accompanied the quilt square we received from St. John's United Church of Christ of Evans City, PA. The huge expansion of creating quilts has found another way of warmth, as UCC quilters exchange a prayer and square with another church. Just be certain to return this great creation of hearts and minds to the adult library.

#### A message from your Stewardship Committee...

In July, the Stewardship Committee sent out a letter regarding our current financial situation. To sum it up, in 2008, we received 144 pledges totaling \$131,000. This year we received 116 pledges totaling \$121,000. We lost 28 or approximately 20% of those who pledged last year. Also, consider the fact that the church budget for 2009 began with an \$18,600 deficit based on a figure of \$123,000 income from pledges.

Since our letter went out in July, we have received such positive feedback that, at this point in time, with 3 months to go, we are sitting at an approximate \$1,500 deficit. That's wonderful news for our church! If this positive response continues throughout our 2010 pledge campaign, then our church profile we submit to the UCC in our search for a new pastor should be favorable. Consider that our church's profile needs to include what we can offer a full or part time minister. And our position in what we can offer needs to be understood before we can make an earnest invite for a pastor to consider our church as his or her home.

As you consider your pledge for 2010, please keep in mind the teachings from the Gospel of Mark where Jesus sat opposite the Treasury and observed the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums; whereas, a poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Jesus then called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she, out of her poverty, has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

It's interesting to hear the different views of what one should give to the church. For the devout Jews in Jesus' time, and for some of us today, the idea of tithing - giving 10% of what one earns - wasn't something to consider or question, it was what God wanted and needs us to do. Yet, many of us do not.

We frequently read about thinking "outside of the box" to meet an extraordinary situation. We need to think "outside of the box" about our giving for 2010. If the numbers we have truly reflect our position and we truly want our church to thrive and continue its various ministries, then we really need to pray long and hard about our pledging for the next year because that is what we will base our church's profile around.

The following chart will show what we can offer a new pastor as his/her annual total compensation package and what increase we would need across the board in order to make such an offer. The figures below reflect an increase based on a starting point of the approved 2009 budgeted income for pledges which, for this year, left us with an overall deficit of \$18,600. The Total Annual Pastoral Package includes Salary, Housing Allowance, FICA, Health Insurance, Life Insurance, etc.
