FROM THE PASTOR

Is the future coming fast enough? Probably not. As I write this, it is sunny and in the 50's. The second warm sunny weekend of the spring. A couple days ago the president and governor announced good news about the epidemic.

The president said he planned on a pretty normal 4th of July this year. The governor announced the schedule for all remaining adults to get the vaccine, The light at the end of the tunnel is brighter, and the light is NOT an oncoming train.

The next day I got scheduled for my first shot. Things are looking up. I should be happy, or at least feel optimistic. But on Saturday I was in a bit of a funk.

We should all be happy. I should be happy. Oops, I used a bad word, "should." "We *should* feel happy" Not a good idea. We can only feel how we feel. We have less control over how we feel, than what we do. So try not to "should" yourself to death.

We are only human. My favorite quote about being human comes from Job 14:

"Mortals, born of woman,

are of few days and full of trouble.

They spring up like flowers and wither away; like fleeting shadows, they do not endure."

We should be gentle with ourselves. We can only do so much and no more. We do not have endless patience, strength, or endurance. We need to rest. We need a break. We need to be sad from time to time.

After the good news, little changed. The changes are still coming. We have to live into the change. Patience is called for. But I want the future to come faster.

But who has patience left? Is yours all used up? I hope not. But if it is, do what is needed to refill your tank. I know Covid has been deadly to our older people. It has been hard on restaurant people and store clerks. It has been exhausting for parents and lonely for kids. We have all given something. Many have given all. We can think we should be stronger because we had a better time of it. But life does not work that way.

It can be hard to be human. Our days are few but God loves us. As the Psalmist wrote,

"What is mankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them? You have made them a little lower than the angels and crowned them with glory and honor."

Life is God's wish for us. But life can be hard. It can also be filled with joy. I look forward to singing again. I look forward to having coffee after worship; that will be a joy. But only if it is safe to do so.

Paul writes, "Be careful, however, that the exercise of your freedom does not become a stumbling block to the weak. Therefore, if what I eat causes my brother to fall into sin, I will never eat meat again, so that I will not cause him to fall."

Let us be open to doing what is best for the most vulnerable, with the understanding that at times we might be vulnerable and need the consideration and help of others.

The future will soon be with us.

The Deacons would like to remind you about the Pearl B. Morrill Trust Fund. This trust was set up by Pearl Morrill for the benefit of the elderly members of the First Congregational Church of Auburn. The Trust has helped several members of the Church with meeting a variety of financial needs. Some things you should know about the Trust:

- The Trust is open to elderly members of the Church. We have agreed that "elderly" is defined as age 55 and older.
- The administrators of the Trust are the Board of Deacons and the Pastor.
- The Pastor may have sole discretion of requests for funds up to \$500. The Pastor and Board of Deacons vote on requests over the \$500 amount.
- Requests can be initiated by any Church member (do not need to be 55 or older) but must be for the benefit of elderly members of the Church. Requests can be for any number of needs such as financial hardships, medical bills, projects that benefit the elderly, etc.
- The Prudential Committee is responsible for investing funds regarding the Trust. Some of these investments are non-taxable (municipal bonds) and some are taxable.
- The Pastor and Board of Deacons are responsible for filing taxes and court documentation. To this end we have secured the services of an accountant to help us in filing taxes.
- Administrative fees (Accounting / Court / Legal) and taxes are paid for out of the Pearl Morrill Trust itself with no impact to the Church's general budget.

If you have any questions regarding the operation of the trust itself, please feel free to contact Pastor Brian, one of the Deacons, or one of the Prudential Committee members.

Pastor Brian and the Deacons continue to welcome requests and ideas for usage of this generous trust and would love to see it put to good use.
