As we watched our sins burn in flames on Ash Wednesday, gathered around an expert fire that roared even as rain poured upon us, we ritualized the spiritual experience of burning all that burdens us so we can find freedom. We all carry plenty of heaviness that we no longer need,

burdens from our past that weigh us down now, causing us to make unhealthy decisions over and over as we keep all of the "stuff" that we store. So, in this season of Lent, start cleaning! Like this poem reminds us, the clutter of our physical lives often mirrors the clutter of our internal lives, so the more we order our homes, the more we can order our soul. Take time to inventory the spaces where you dwell, finding what needs to be discarded. Take time to inventory your inner spaces, listing the sins and letting them burn. Remember that fire from Ash Wednesday, and if you weren't there, then have a look at this image as you imagine all the named sins burning into ashes and no longer holding you captive in the same way. While burning may often be viewed as a way to destroy, in that destruction, there is an ending that is ultimately purifying. You are worthy of Christ's freedom and are called to be new.

This is an annual trip, and all are welcome to join me in February 2026.




# **BIBLE STUDY OPPORTUNITIES**
