

ets are available at the Auburn Historical Museum, the Auburn Public Library, at The Farmer's Daughter, or call Rosalie at 508-832-3198.



HYMN OF THE MONTH:

*"I Love to Tell the Story"*A. Katherine Hankey—William G. Fischer 1866

This anthem is based on a poem written by Katherine Hankey, born 1834 in England. Early in life Kate became involved in religious work, teaching Sunday School and organizing a Bible Study for factory girls in London. She had a passion for foreign missions, and later in life devoted all proceeds from her writing to missionary work. One winter Kate became seriously ill, confined to bed for a full year. To occupy her time, she wrote a poem of one hundred stanzas entitled "The Old, Old Story." The following year, at the international convention of the Young Men's Christian Association; Major General Russel ended his powerful sermon by quoting from Kate's poem, leaving the audience breathless. Composer William G. Fischer set a portion of the poem to music, becoming the hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story."

FROM THE CHOIR ROOM

This December finds us with a wealth of musical offerings.

December 3rd, the choir will introduce a new anthem, "Breath of Heaven." Words and music by Chris Eaton and Amy Grand; choral setting by Lloyd Larson. The subtitle is "Mary's Song," and the entire anthem is sung from Mary's perspective. This expressive anthem opens with Mary, speaking (through song) to God. Her fear, and heartbreaking prayer for help overwhelm with intensity. This is one of the most beautifully written and powerful anthems I've come across in quite some time. Also that day, violinist Krzysztof Gadawski will be guest performing a Bach piece, "Come, Savior of the Gentiles."

December 10th features the beautiful solo piece "Gesu Bambino" (The Infant Jesus) to be sung by Pam Tentor. This anthem by Pietro Young, tells the Christmas Story through soaring soprano melody.

December 17th the choir will present our Christmas Cantata, "Born a Savior, Born a King." Rev. Knox will narrate and guest musician, Rolph Holly, will play trumpet. Note our beautiful program insert—thanks Tammy!

December 24th the service features our youth. In addition to the Christmas Pageant, Joyful Noyse will present two anthems: "Light One Candle," a Christmas Eve song, and "Come Light of the World," foretelling the birth of Jesus. The choir will present another new anthem, "How Quietly" by Joel Raney. This prayerful anthem incorporates "Away in a Manger" and speaks of, "This precious gift given for me, this Holy Child."

On Christmas Eve, Joyful Noyse will sing at the 5:00 service, while the adult choir sings at 11:00 p.m. with guest organist, Kurt Blomstrom.

This is truly a month to come and experience the power and majesty of beautiful music.

LIBRARY TIDINGS

The 20th, Tidings articles are due, and the only subject that comes to mind, of course, is Christmas. The libraries are blessed with a generous number of superb Christmas books for every conceivable taste and age.

The mail arrives. The first piece opened bears the title *Banning Christmas In America* and is an appeal which addresses the hunt, by some, for public nativity scenes, religious ornaments and displays, Christmas carols, public prayers, biblical references, and any other "offensive" form of free expression that violates the so-called separation of "church and state." However, a survey in 2005 tallies that 95% of North Americans practice no restraint in saying Merry Christmas. What next?

Have borrowed a copy of 365 Windows (2 minute meditations for daily use) by Halford E. Luccock. You'll find a limited, but subtle link on page 336. It reads: "If Christianity is to win against the forces of evil, it will not be done by people fighting singly. One pastor has illustrated the need for working together in churches. A single light or two or even one hundred won't do it, but the lights of a whole city will light a night sky . . . Prayer. In these days we need to stand together, all believers in God, all people in all churches, side by side. In the spirit of our Master, Jesus Christ. Amen."

Yes, there's a link, but what about <u>Christmas</u>? In an effort to pull all of this together, here are two books of many that carry its tender and potent Christmas message. Neither takes a long time to read and their message strengthens the celebration of this beautiful season.

#1 Christmas Tapestry by Patricia Polacco - a children's paperback given by Sue Campbell. The author adapted this story from a tale she hears in homilies—once in the 60's from Dr. Clarence Riedenbach of Oakland Ecumenical Council and once in the 90's on Robert Schuller's Hour of Power. Both were presented as true stories which were adapted for young readers, with the setting changed. No clues other than it brought tears of happiness.

#2 The Golden Ring by John Snyder - an adult book; new in 2001.

A very special golden ring was given to Anna by her parents on her 9th birthday. Rather than in the ring itself, its true significance lies in the powerful lesson it teaches concerning the goodness that comes from giving. This book is also based on a true story and the print is medium-large.

May your most precious Christmas gift be a sense of God's love and peace within your soul.




