We have found our new pastor!

We would like to introduce our candidate, Brian Michael Grover. After reviewing countless profiles and conducting dozens of phone, Skype and personal interviews we have determined that Brian is a perfect fit for our church.

Brian is 43 and originally from northern New Hampshire. He received his Masters in Divinity from Bangor Theological Seminary in 1998 and was ordained in 1999. He has been serving his current church, Congregational UCC of Huron, South Dakota, since July 2001. In his life before seminary, Brian served five years as an officer in the US Army including five months in Operation Desert Storm and received his call to ministry in the desert of Iraq.

The following is a paragraph from Brian's profile that attracted us and made us want to schedule an initial interview. "I think the church can resemble a large extended family. It is one of the few places in our society that allows people of several generations to interact. I find I have been attracted to churches with a strong component of older members. I find it important to have a strong group of older members, they often stabilize the church. The problem is to stabilize the church without letting it harden into rigidity and stop growing. Too often society separates the generations. I enjoy the opportunity to listen to the voice of wisdom one day and the next day enjoy the energy and play of youth."

Jennie is Brian's wife of three years and is a teacher. Foster parenting is near and dear to Jennie and Brian. They have raised 3 foster sons. Brian has also been actively involved in Rotary, Cub Scouts, past Commander of VFW and American Legion Posts.

It is our plan to bring Brian and Jennie out for his candidating weekend Thursday, February 24th - Sunday, February 27th. The weekend will culminate with Brian preaching on Sunday, the 27th, with a congregational vote immediately following the service. If all goes well, and it is a "positive" vote, Brian's first day of work will be June 1st with his first Sunday preaching June 5th.

On Saturday, March 5th, as part of the Massachusetts Conference United Church of Christ Super Saturday, the Confirmation Class will be assembling school kits for Church World Service. School kits give children in impoverished schools, refugee camps, or other difficult settings some of the basic tools for learning.

The Confirmation Class needs your help to gather the supplies. A school kit consists of:

- 1 pair of blunt metal scissors (rounded tip)
- 3 70 count spiral notebooks or notebooks totaling 200-210 pages (no loose-leaf/filler paper)

- 1 large eraser
- 6 new pencils with erasers

New Life

Chapter 37 of the prophet Ezekiel tells of the remarkable event in *the Valley of Dry Bones*. We should have no confusion over who and what this means. Verse 11 makes it clear when God addresses Ezekiel and tells him: *Mortal, these bones are the whole House of Israel. They say, "Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost..."*

We are told from the beginning that what happens is a *spiritual* event. In verse one, the prophet declares: *The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley...* We are familiar with what happens next: The bones rise up and stand. Then sinews appear and bind them together. Flesh comes upon them to fill them out, and skin appears to cover them.

Finally, as verse 10 says, *Breath came into them, and they lived*... Verse 11 follows and identifies who they are, as we said above. These are *the whole House of Israel*, which means *the chosen people of God*. That means us - *the Church today*. In too many places today, *the Church is a valley of dry bones* until God breathes new life into us.

We learn several important things from this text. One is that bone, sinew, flesh, skin, and breath are each necessary for the whole to live. Secondly, this text speaks to us not merely as individual persons, but as *the whole people of God*. The Church needs bone, sinew, flesh, skin, and breath to be a living community. Finally, God does not act on his own. He does not wave a magic wand for the dry bones to stand up and live. The Lord works *in partnership with human agency* - in this case, the prophet Ezekiel. At each step, the Lord *instructs Ezekiel* what to do. If Ezekiel fails to do his part, nothing will happen by the Lord's hand alone.

Consider the parts. The bones are the framework. The framework of the Church is the liturgy, the sacraments, and an orderly approach to the scriptures through the lectionary. A proper framework has been lost by many churches today that rely only on random topical preaching.

The sinews are the history and teaching tradition, the ancient confessions and creeds of the faith that reach back to Apostolic Order. Again, this is lost in churches today that rely only on what "great thoughts" pop into the preacher's head, or on an idiosyncratic interpretation of scripture.

The flesh is the community of believers who *claim their own authority* in the faith because they are *in-formed* about their faith. The skin is the prayer and praise they offer to make their presentation to the world.

Finally, the "breath" of God is *the Holy Spirit*. Without a *charismatic anointing*, faith is not animated. It may look good on paper or sound good in word and song, but it has no life. The end of verse 8 leads into verses 9 and 10. There, Ezekiel views the resurrection of the bones completed with flesh and skin, and says, *But there was no breath in them...* The Lord then says, *Prophesy to the breath and say: "Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live."*


Ezekiel then reports: *I prophesied as the Lord commanded me, and the breath came into them and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude...* In the original Hebrew, the English words "wind," "breath," and "spirit" are the same. Without the anointing of the Lord Holy Spirit, we are nothing.


