Also, another gift, this one from the Woodcock's daughter, Dorothy, is some more large print books. Temporarily in storage with Christmas books are *A Christmas Promise* by Thomas Kinkade and Katherine Spencer, as well as *A Christmas Star* and *A New Leaf*! Two more LARGE PRINT books are Jan Keron's *These High Green Hills* and *Mitford Bedside Companion* – many thanks for all.

No Matter What by Debi Gliori (large book) - "I'm grim and I'm grumpy," says Small to Large, "and I don't think you love me at all." But, that isn't so. Large knows how to reassure Small in a tender and convincing way about a loving relationship between a parent and a child.

What Grandpas Do Best by Laura Numeroff and illustrated by Lynn Munsinger - NOW TURN THE BOOK UPSIDE DOWN to read *What Grandma's Do Best*, same author and illustrator. In short order the answer is made perfectly clear in what each does.

Goodnight, Goodnight Construction Site by Sherbi Durkey and Tom Lightenheld - Comments: "Delightful" – N.Y. Times; Parents will see and shout, "At last!"; Truck lovers are enthusiastic

Courtney by John Burningham - The opening line, "We would really like to have a dog," the children said. "Our house would be much better with a dog. The dog could play with us." And thus begins a wonderful adventure of a wonderfully illustrated cartoon-like family of mother, father, the two kids, baby and Courtney. (large book)
