Tidings for January





My mind then darted to how race has become a core issue following the devastation caused by hurricane Katrina.

Next, it was to Hank Stolz who devoted his morning segment on W.T.A.G. to race relations. One caller alluded to the fact that those who are mal-actors, though a small group, can cast a pall on the whole. Another addressed the attitude and environment within a home and its tremendous influence.

The finale to this sequence of thoughts came from an article my college roommate had sent. The title is *In 2005*, *White Flight Moves In the Wrong Direction*. The jist—when blacks were newly liberated from legal segregation they began fanning out into neighborhoods from which they'd been restricted. Some whites were traumatized by this thought and put their houses up for sale.

In various sections of this country Asian students are vigorously responding to math and science while significant numbers of other students are being stinted in academic growth by the fruits of our "dumbing down" education in the name of "self esteem". Of course there is more to this issue like parents putting their children in schools which are less Asian, less demanding or private.




