FROM THE PASTOR

I heard that Homeland Security spent money on a plan in case zombies attack! I hear sports radio hosts talking about buying emergency meals in bulk at Costco. People are worried. Why?

There were dire predictions of what would happen if Obama was elected. There were dire predictions of what would happen if Romney was elected. Television news (maybe all news) sells fear. CNN and Fox News had their best ratings right after 9/11, when the whole nation was in shock and panic. If I think life is good, I skip the news channels. Only when there is a storm coming or some big tragedy do I tune in. Bad, scary news is profitable for the news industry. As I write this, Newtown is begging the news people for some peace and decorum. Will they get it?

In all of this talk of the end, in all the fear, we forget the signs of new life. Violence and crime of all types are down from the highs of the 1980's and 90's. The poorest American is richer and healthier than even the richest person was 1000 years ago. Yet are we happier? Probably not.

A researcher found that if you give a child a gift, that child is happier than if you give that child a choice of gifts and then give them the preferred gift. It seems the child questions whether what she/he got was really the "best" choice. By choosing, some doubt comes in to dampen the child's happiness. In America we have lots of choices and our kids have choices we never had; soccer versus Scouts; baseball versus swimming lessons. The choices are endless and researchers tell us that with choice comes worry and regret.

I am sure the world will not end soon. Neither Mayans, zombies, or mass killers worry me much. What worries me is how happy and blessed we all could feel, and yet . . . sorrow, worry, and regret prevail.

I think our ability to overlook the blessings we receive is best expressed in the words of a song.

Count your blessings, name them one by one, Count your blessings, see what God has done! Count your blessings, name them one by one, And it will surprise you what the Lord has done.

The Reverend Dr. Carl F. Schultz, Jr., a leading pastor of the United Church of Christ, went to eternal life on Monday, Dec. 3, 2012, in Hartford surrounded by the love of his family. He was 80. Rev. Schultz was born in Hyannis, MA, the only son of Reverend Dr. Carl F. Schultz and Janet Schultz. He leaves his wife of 57 years, Della M. (MacAskill) Schultz. On October 4, 1959, Rev. Schultz was ordained to the Christian Ministry in the Plymouth Congregational Church in Plymouth, NH. After serving 3 years at Plymouth Church, he was called to become the pastor of First Congregational Church in Auburn, MA, where he served from 1962 to 1968. During his time in Auburn, Rev. Schultz was part-time Director of the Worcester Council of Churches Pastoral Committee, an elected member to the Auburn School Committee and active in the civil rights and ecumenical movement. For 34 years, Rev. Schultz served as Senior Pastor of First Church of Christ Congregational,

in Glastonbury. Following his retirement from First Church, he served for over 2 years as the Interim Senior Pastor at historic Old South Church in Boston. Rev. Schultz graduated cum laude from Tufts University in 1956 and was awarded a Master of Divinity degree from Andover Newton Theological Seminary in 1959. In 1986, Rev. Schultz earned a Doctor of Ministry from the Hartford Seminary. A memorial service was held on December 8 at the First Church of Christ in Glastonbury. The Mulryan Funeral Home handled arrangements.

Please pray for the Schultz family during this time of loss.

Surrounded by his loving family, **Carl H. Johnson**, **Jr.**, 85, passed away Thursday, December 6 at Life Care Center in Auburn. He leaves behind his wife of 63 years, Lorain (Fletcher) Johnson; his daughter Karen Wojcik and her husband Theodore of Auburn; his daughter Lynn Shaw of Worcester; his son Carl "Skip" Johnson and his wife Jean of Holden; his daughter Paula Woelfel and her husband Frank of Millbury; his son Alan Johnson of Auburn; his son William Johnson and his wife Lauri of Harvard; and his daughter Laurel Post and her husband Gary of Douglas; 13 grandchildren and 1 great grandchild. He also leaves a sister, Brenda Morrow, and her husband Ronald of Holden, a brother, Robert Johnson, and his wife, Barbara, of Rutland, and several nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by a brother, Ronald "Kenneth" Johnson, and sister, Marjorie Meni Cutch.

Carl was born in Hyde Park, MA on February 22, 1927 the son of Carl H. Johnson, Sr. and Doris Tanner. He attended Boys Trade School of Worcester and later enlisted in the Army. He worked at Crompton & Knowles, Wyman Gordon and was an Auburn police officer for 34 years. Carl was a past master of Joel H. Prouty Lodge of Masons in Auburn from 1990-1991, and held numerous roles in the Masons including Past Master of Sixth Lodge of Instruction, Worcester Scottish Rite, and Connecticut Valley Consistory. He was a long time secretary of the Auburn Charitable Association. He was president and an assistant coach of the Auburn American Little League for many years. He was also a member of the Auburn Town Council and an avid church member of the First Congregational Church of Auburn. Carl was an accomplished woodworker. A memorial service was held Monday, December 10, 2012, at the First Congregational Church, Auburn, MA. Carl will be greatly missed by his church family. Please be in prayer for his loved ones.




