June is Myasthenis Gravis Awareness Month, National Scleroderma Awareness Month, Home Safety Month, National Scoliosis Awareness Month, and June 1st - July 4th is Fireworks Safety Month. The Tools & Blankets Program, through Church World Service, is an offering to help people who have been devastated by tragedy such as the tens of thousands of people in Myanmar (Burma) who are struggling in the wake of Cyclone Nargis. Church World Service is initially providing emergency relief assistance - particularly clean water, medical supplies, and shelter materials - and is coordinating with its partners in Myanmar on



plans for long-term recovery. Your offering will go towards items like tools needed to plant gardens, build shelters and provide materials for blankets and clothes to those in need.

LEDGER 1773-1786

A few years ago I read and copied a ledger that was stored in the town hall basement. I don't believe this book has been read in the last two hundred years. It is a complete record of the step -by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town. The following are excerpts from these writings.

The aforegoing Votes Passed at S'meeting. Attest. John Chandler, moderator

Worcester, July 27, 1773

Jacob Stevens precinct Clerk, Comfort Rice, Alexander Nichols, Benjamin Carter, John Hart, Assessors and Jonathan Stone, Treasurer & Thomas Baird, Jurn. Collector were legally sworn to the faithful Discharge of the Respective offices.

John Chandler, Justice of the Peace Entered from the Original of Jacob Stevens, S' Clerk

Worcester July 27, 1773

To Jacob Stevens, Parish Clerk, you are hearby required to notify and worn the inhabitance of a Parish lately Set to from Worcester, Sutton, Oxford and Lestor qualified by law to vot in Parish affairs to meat at the hous of Thomas Drury Jonyour inholder in Worcester in the said parish in Tuesday ye 27 Day of August to Act on the following articals, to choes a moderator for Said meting, 2 to se what matters Said parish will com into to provide preching for the present, 3 to see what Said parish will toward a meting hous or act thereon a building, said Parish se fit. Hearof feall not and make due return of your Doings here in hous of the Subscribers on or before the Said 27 Day of August.

Witness our hands & seal this 27 Day of July 1773.

I certify that the above was lodged in the Secretary's office this 15 day of March 1774 agreeable to the order of General Court passed the 23 Day of June last for erecting a Precinct out of Worcester, Leicester, Oxford and Sutton.

Liard Apple Cake

Preheat oven @ 350 degrees.

Ingredients:	
3 Cups Flour	3 Eggs
¹ / ₂ tsp Salt	2 Cups Sugar
1 tsp Baking Soda	1 Cup Oil
2 tsp Cinnamon	2 tsp Vanilla
3 Cups Unpeeled, Cored, Chopped Apples	1 Cup Chopped Nuts (optional)

Sift dry ingredients into large bowl. Mix in apples & nuts. Beat eggs into sugar, one at a time until fluffy. Add Oil; beat well; add vanilla. Stir mixture into dry ingredients. Blend well. Batter will be stiff.

Pour into 13x9 pan or tube pan. Bake for 40 - 60 minutes until inserted toothpick comes out clean. Enjoy!

Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

THE CHURCH LIBRARIES ARE NOT TAKING A VACATION THIS SUMMER

Instead, they're sending out a message that when "the livin' is easy" and "the fish are jumpin" it's time to forget the "slippin' and the slidin" and the "gasin' and the ridin" AND start "travelin' by readin" some of the great books - ADULT and CHILDREN'S - in the children's library. Remember that it's at the end of the hall from the vestry where church services are being held during renovations of the sanctuary.

The following books being reviewed will be on display in the temporary library corner (TLC).

<u>Bud Not Buddy</u> by Christopher Paul Curtis is a book that Ron and Connie Hanks have been recommending lately for adults to read. It's listed among books for children 8 and up. We reviewed this book several years ago and everyone says it's a <u>good</u> book.

The year is '36 i.e., 1936. The place—Flint, Michigan. His age - 10. His momma? He's motherless and his father is a mystery man but Bud thinks there is a clue in flyers his momma left him on Herman Calloway and his Dusty Devastators of the Depression. Bud's suitcase holds his treasures and <u>NOTHING</u> is going to stop him from finding this band leader - his dad? It's an adventure and amazing lesson wrapped up in one award recipient that you won't want to miss.

You've probably heard of the author Deepak Chopra, M.D. whose book, <u>The Seven Spiritual Laws of Success</u>, sold well over a million copies. Following this, he received so many letters from people, he was inspired to write <u>The Seven Spiritual Laws for Parents</u>. It's an effective translation for children of the first book. He begins with the fact that success depends on who you are, NOT on what you did. His concern is that parents must nourish their children's spiritual needs in this world of chaos and instability. We are responsible for as many children as possible to grow up in a civilization that has been transformed by love and compassion. There's a listing of 7 laws for success and the following is a listing re-phrased so that children will be able to understand and use them.

1st law - Everything is possible 2nd law - If you want to get something - give 3rd law - When you make a choice, you change the future 4th law - Don't say no - go with the flow 5th law - Every time you wish or want, you plant a seed 6th law - Enjoy the journey 7th law - You are here for a reason

Every child has a spiritual life already. How come? Because we are born into the space of creativity and unspoiled awareness that is spirit.

Is it getting complicated? Not really. You might need to read some sentences twice but the understanding becomes 2 x's as clear.

Over a month ago, a beautiful children's book was found in the stand of the adult library. Its illustrations are brilliant and incredibly good in explaining how a stripy, little caterpillar turns into <u>The Butterfly</u>. That's its title and it's written by Anna Melbourne and Cathy Shimmer.

In a note, Norma Card, wrote that she has made the gift (actually 2) in appreciation of having the church library. Her concluding line was so beautifully significant. "Butterflies are a living confirmation of resurrection."

Our thanks to children through seniors who support the library and we're looking forward to new faces.


Outreach Farmer's mARKet

"Inch by inch, row by row, gonna make this garden grow. All it takes is a rake and hoe and a piece of fertile ground. Inch by inch, row by row, please bless these seeds I sow, keep them safe and warm below, 'til the rain comes a tumbling down."

Outreach will also be selling more Amish Friendship bread throughout the summer as well. Our Ark has bunnies and chicks so far, and we are hoping to have 2 water buffalo after the harvest! So, look for the farmer's mARKet coming soon!
