She teaches in several school districts using the computer technology that helps defeat the long distances people must face in South Dakota.

Jenney and I were foster Parents in South Dakota, and we will look into foster care in Massachusetts. All of our foster sons are on their own and are no longer living with us.

We are excited to be in Auburn and look forward to ministering to the church and in the community.

June 1- July 4 is Fireworks Safety Month. June 1 - 30 is Home Safety Month, Cataract Awareness Month, Men's Health Month, National Aphasia Awareness Month, and National Scleroderma Awareness Month.

JUNE 5TH is NATIONAL CANCER SURVIVORS DAY!
GOD BLESS YOU and your families for all you went through!
June 13-19 is Men's Health Week.

July only has UV Safety listed in the National Health Calendar, but this is a huge topic. The UV rays can cause skin damage which through melanomas can cause death. UV rays are also dangerous to your eyes. Sunglasses are strongly recommended.

UVA rays cause skin aging and wrinkling and contribute to skin cancer, such as melanoma. Because UVA rays pass effortlessly through the ozone layer (the protective layer of atmosphere, or shield, surrounding the earth), they make up the majority of our sun exposure. Beware of tanning beds because they use UVA rays as well as UVB rays. A UVA tan does not help protect the skin from further sun damage; it merely produces color and a false sense of protection from the sun.

UVB rays are also dangerous, causing sunburns, cataracts (clouding of the eye lens) and effects on the immune system. They also contribute to skin cancer. Melanoma, the most dangerous form of skin cancer, is thought to be associated with severe UVB sunburns that occur before the age of 20. Most UVB rays are absorbed by the ozone layer, but enough of these rays pass through to cause serious damage.

UVC rays are the most dangerous, but fortunately, these rays are blocked by the ozone layer and don't reach the earth. What's important is to protect your family from exposure to UVA and UVB, the rays that cause skin damage.

August is Children's Eye Health and Safety Month and National Immunization Awareness Month.

I'm hosting a flu clinic with the Auburn CVS on Sunday, September 18, 2011. The CVS pharmacist will bring everything needed and will set up in Fellowship Hall. If you are interested, I can obtain your insurance information ahead of time and work with Jim Higgins, Registered Pharmacist, to let you know if a co-payment will be required and, if so, what it will be. He will be sending more information, but the date is set for September 18th. So mark your calendars.

BACK TO HAITI

As you may or may not know, Randy and I will be returning to Haiti this fall (October $3^{\rm rd} - 12^{\rm th}$). We will be traveling with Monadnock Bible Conference again, but this time we will be part of a medical mission that provides free medical care to the people of Haiti. In Haiti you have to pay "up front" for any medical care. The clinics provided by MBC may be the only care these people receive. It is also quite common for collections to be taken from the missions team to provide for surgical procedures that can not be performed by the clinics themselves such as hernias, abscesses and other more in depth treatments. We will also be spending some time with the orphans from Redeemer's Child Orphanage and checking out the progress on the new orphanage we broke ground on last November.

"MBC ministries, are mercy and compassion based but do not diminish or lack the power of the gospel. At MBC we see it as counterintuitive and disingenuous to see a brother or sister in need and say, 'Go, I wish you well. Keep warm and well fed' and yet do nothing about it. The Haitians have a proverb; 'sak vid pa kanpe' an empty sack doesn't stand up, meaning a hungry person can't do anything. This person is so overwhelmed by their condition that words are seldom heard, but actions are understood. As we meet physical needs (hunger, thirst, naked, sick . . .) we have the opportunity to speak to spiritual needs in Jesus' name."

As the time for our trip draws closer, we *may* take up a collection for some over the counter medications and such, but <u>right now what we really need is our Church's help to get there</u>. The Outreach Committee has generously donated \$500 for our trip deposits, but we still need to raise a minimum of another \$2,200 (maybe more depending on what the ongoing crisis in the Mid East does to gas prices, and therefore, airfare). **We are so grateful** for your ongoing support and love.
