### FROM THE PASTOR

As I write this, we are getting partly sunny days after a couple months when it rained all day, every day, or so it seemed. With the sun out, I notice my mood is also sunnier. I think that is true for many of us. No matter how deep in technology we get, and how far from nature we become, the weather still has a great effect on us.

I think this spring people were more down then they normally are. Depression is a problem for many people. Many people suffer in silence. People are afraid to bring it up. I know having a serious discussion is not the most fun thing to do. But it can really help. I do not think talking about depression or asking if someone is doing alright will lead people down a spiral. Rather it might help people connect, and feel less isolated.

My mom was the clan babysitter. She babysat for a lot of my older cousins until I got old enough to babysit by myself. After every babysitting job, the one we babysat for would try to pay my mom. This would result in 15-30 minutes of a hand fight as Mom gave back the money and the cousin kept trying to give Mom the money. It got pretty ridiculous. Two fully grown women trying to slip \$5 into each other's pockets or purse. It was a long night of reverse pickpocketing.

I did not want to do that. I did the one rejection plan.

"How much is babysitting?"

"You are family; it is free."

"No, I will pay you \$2 an hour." (Yeah, I am OLD!)

"Ok, thanks."

The first rejection was the polite rejection. The second rejection was a real rejection. That is how to start a "serious" talk, I think. Let who you are talking with get one rejection.

"Do you want to talk?

"No"

"No, I am being serious here. Would you like to talk?"

If that gets another "NO," then let it drop. Otherwise, let the talk go where it will. Talking about depression is not really talking about depression. It is talking about how much you care about the person; you care enough to notice.

I think the devil loves silence; the devil loves secrets. Silence and secrets isolate people. People are strong in community and weaker when isolated.

It is no accident that God spoke creation into being. Speaking is a holy thing. So if you see friends and family that seem to have changed, say something. It might spark people to get help if they need it.

May we all have a sunny and joyful summer.

June is Cataract Awareness Month, Alzheimer's & Brain Awareness Month, Men's Health Month, National Migraine and Headache Awareness Month, National Safety Month, and Hernia Awareness Month.

July is Cord Blood Awareness Month, Juvenile Arthritis Awareness Month, National Cleft & Craniofacial Awareness & Prevention Month.

August is Children's Eye Health and Safety Month, National Breastfeeding Month, National Immunization Awareness Month, and Psoriasis Awareness Month.

We have seen many cases of measles in the news lately due to lack of vaccinations. There had been a concern of the vaccination causing autism and the research shows that it doesn't. Measles is highly contagious and has become a problem. Other diseases that had been eradicated in the U.S. are returning because people aren't getting their babies vaccinated; small pox and TB have returned.

### FROM THE OUTREACH COMMITTEE

I think I speak for the entire Outreach Committee when I say the month of May has been busy and uplifting for all of us fortunate to serve on this committee.

Our food pantry received approximately \$72.00 in donations from church members.

At our April meeting we received a piece of mail from a non-profit organization called Honor Flight New England. Their one goal is to take New England area WWII and Korean veterans on a one-day trip to Washington, DC to visit and reflect at the memorials that were built in their honor. Since June of 2009 they have made this dream come true for over 1,950 veterans. The trip is completely free to the veterans. A guest is welcome to join them for a fee. Our own, the late Don Woodcock, was lucky enough to take part in this program. His wife, Marion, could not say enough good about his experience. If you know of anyone who qualifies for this trip, please share this information with them. Further details are available thru our church secretary, Denise. They typically run 4-6 trips per year. The Outreach Committee was happy to donate \$100.00, collected at the Palm Sunday Breakfast, to this worthwhile cause.

May 9th found us at the Thursday Cafe, a program held at All Saints Episcopal Church in downtown Worcester. They are open from noon until 4pm and serve the homeless population in the area. We cooked and served a hot meal for 120 visitors. We also provided socks, underwear, and personal hygiene items as well as some used clothing. Each participant is invited to take one item from each station. Also available are ingredients to make sandwiches for later in the day and inflatable beds where they can rest. So many of the participants expressed sincere gratitude to us for helping them this way.

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
### Outreach Committee (continued from page 4)

Our upstairs classroom was filled with bags of food; every table and chair covered, and the floor. We have quite a project ahead of us sorting and finding storage for all this wonderful food!! We want to thank all of you who have come in to help sort the food. The people of Auburn are a very generous group.

As we wind down for the summer, we want to remind you that Outreach is a mission of this church. We, as a committee, are delegating the spending of your dollars. We are always open to suggestions and hope you will come to us with what you think is a worthy cause and something we should consider supporting. Have a fun and safe summer.
