## From the Pastor

I was recently scouring through some of my old books that need to be thrown out as I slim down my library. In the process, I came across a chapter in one book that told the story of Oresdes Brownson, a Boston preacher who lived in the early 1800's. He was born in Vermont, (an immediate connection) and switched denominations. He was an early advocate for workers' rights. In 1841 he realized that he had watered down the demands of Christianity because he thought he was making it easier for unbelievers to become Christians. He discovered that he won more converts when he began preaching about the demands Christianity puts upon people. Christ had not been timid about his demands on his followers.

Very likely this has something to do with our struggle to make faith and the Church a priority in our lives. We try to make faith and Church so comfortable, easy, and undemanding that people give it a low priority, and we still burn out our leaders. Perhaps we need to set a higher standard and a more rigorous faith as Oresdes Brownson discovered. It is worth a try.





### One Great Hour of Sharing - What is it?

One Great Hour of Sharing, as part of our Churches' Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in more than eighty countries, including the United States. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water and food, education and health care, small business micro -credit, emergency relief, and advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons. OGHS also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response. More than 60 percent of the UCC's offering supports international development initiatives, including annual support for approximately ten missionaries working in health care, education, and agricultural development. Gifts are also used for disaster preparedness and response, refugee and immigration advocacy and assistance and related volunteer initiatives.

The OGHS special mission offering is received through local UCC congregations and all UCC members are encouraged to participate in this way. A school with no teachers? Well, almost....

One of the responsibilities of the Board of Christian Ed. is to provide teachers and teachers' aids for our Sunday School students. Yes, I used the words TEACHERS and STUDENTS. Our teachers expect that they are there to teach, and that the youngsters are there to learn. We currently have a scant four regular teachers. Three on rotation for 4<sup>th</sup> through 6<sup>th</sup> grades, and one for our 3 through 5 year olds. The current staffing situation forces us to combine Preschool and 1<sup>st</sup> through 3<sup>rd</sup> grades and adapt the lesson to try and suit the broader age range. Both the teacher and the student lose in this situation. Our junior high teachers have no students as they have all gone on to Confirmation activities. Our staffing should be:

- 3, 4, and 5 year olds** – One teacher and an aid weekly, currently: Heather Zautner
- 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> grades** – One teacher and an aid weekly, currently: Heather Zautner
- 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, and 6<sup>th</sup> grades** – One teacher and an aid weekly, currently: Mike Schillinger, Sandi Rhodes, and Sandy Landry
- Junior High** – One teacher and an aid weekly, currently: Rich McPherson and Janice Green

Our **Cradle Roll Program** (toddlers up to 3 year olds) also needs to have two adults covering weekly. Sandi Rhodes and Shirley Hill, among others, have been filling in here as needed.

To be fair to our Sunday School staff, we would like to have enough teachers and aids so that each one gets at least one week to attend Sunday Service monthly. This would require a 3 teacher rotation per grade level. Imagine yourself sacrificing this time in praise and communion with our congregation. This is the situation for some of our teachers.

So, ideally, our Sunday School staff should consist of a minimum of 12 teachers and 3 adults to cover all four grade levels and Cradle Roll. We fall far short of this number.

You, the congregation, are our only resource for meeting this need. During every Baptism at First Congregational Church, we pledge to do our part in the Christian upbringing of the newly Baptized. Volunteering to be a Sunday School teacher or an aid is certainly in keeping with that pledge.

Please feel free to contact any of our teaching staff if you would like to help us out or simply have questions about our Sunday School program. Please help us in our effort to set a good foundation for our youngsters.

Library Tidings

Ayaan Herst Ali is a beautiful young woman with amazing courage and a feisty determination to speak the truth in an effort to make the world aware of Islamic ideology and practices. As a result, she's become a controversial political figure whose life is under constant threat by terrorists. As a child, she was living under the Muslim faith in Somalia, Saudi Arabia and Kenya and life became more and more of a nightmare. In her early 20's she became the bride in a forced marriage and sought asylum in the Netherlands. She would never forget the day that she finally reached Holland and was told, "You can stay in Holland for the rest of your life. You are a recognized refugee." This policewoman told her that there was no better status than the A-1 status refugee. Amazed by all of the benefits which accompanied the rating, Ayaan asked, "Why are you doing all this?" The answer, "The authorities have determined that you have a well founded fear of Persecution. It's the law." The next pages are filled with astounding adventures which include our author serving as a member of Parliament in Holland. It's hard to put this book down and when, in the second page of the last chapter you read, "I was no longer Dutch," and it's May 2006, you can't digest those final pages fast enough. You'll be glad that you read this timely book titled *Infidel*.

*Joshua - A Parable for Today, Joshua and the Children, and Joshua in the Holy Land* are three paperbacks written by Father Joseph F. Girzone who, because of poor health, began his writing career in 1986.

"Sometimes it happens after 2000 years the human race is given another chance." This isn't the story of a biblical figure. Actually, it was Carol Millar who told us what good reading these books provided. Joshua is a quiet and simple man by whom the town people are baffled. Finally, to resolve their quandary, the local church leaders confront Joshua. This deeply moving book has been called "engrossing," "life-changing," "inspiring," "entertaining," and, to top it off, an exercise in spirituality that is appealing.

In the second book, Joshua is in another town whose people are at odds with themselves. The children first notice something unusual about Joshua and it is through them that he works to reform the village as a loving stranger. You, as the reader, can write (mentally) your own description of the role of *Joshua in the Holy Land* in the third of Father Girzone's series.

How about picking up *And God Blessed the Irish - the Story of Patrick* by Chris Driscoll, available in the children's library. Susan Krikorian has done some perky black and white illustrations. This adventurous tale of a boy who was kidnapped, sold as a slave, and escaped is great to tie in with St. Patrick's Day. Just think, he changed the history of Ireland and the world. It's an excellent book to read as a family. It was published in Worcester, MA.

### News from Outreach

The Outreach Committee has calendars and ark banks available (in Fellowship Hall) to help raise money to buy chicks and bunnies for Easter. This is through the Heifer Project. Our overall goal is to build an ark with a pair of several different kinds of animals. The chicks and bunnies are the first of these purchases over the next few years. The chicks, after six months, can lay up to 200 eggs a year. The extra eggs can be sold to pay for school, clothes and medicine. Rabbits have as many as 40 offspring in a year. They provide families with a steady source of protein and income. Rabbit manure can be applied to the gardens to make them produce more crops or vegetables. The calendars cover a 4 week period, so we would like them back by Easter, March 23, 2008.

### **Calling All Confirmands**

We would like to recognize all confirmands who were confirmed by Rev. Knox (1985-2008) at the 10:00 a.m. Service of Confirmation on Sunday, April 13th. All confirmands are invited to be present and participate. Family members and friends, please pass this information on. (Ages would be approximately 15 years old to 38 years old.)

I recently came across an article in the *U.C.C. News* of 2001 which I had saved. You might be interested. In 2001, there were 855 ordained U.C.C. clergy in Massachusetts including active and retired ministers. Of these, 18% were 45 years old or younger, 55% were between 46 and 65, and 27% were over 65 years old. Now, six years later, the number of U.C.C. active clergy has decreased by 341 persons and the U.C.C. retirees has increased by 234.

When I was attending Andover-Newton (1963-1969), the enrollment was burgeoning (74% increase from 1956-1963). Now it is not. The average age of students is 40 years old. The average debt load of a U.C.C. seminary graduate is \$28,072. The world of U.C.C. entry level clergy has totally changed. None of our old assumptions reflect reality. I can't imagine the stresses upon new clergy entering ministry. It will be important to listen carefully to the Massachusetts Conference information about clergy. I am in a bit of shock just writing this.

However, God will find a way to guide the right person to you. Pray, and pray for openness to that process.
