#### Advertising

There are many oxymorons in our culture. Things like jumbo shrimp, and the idea that media does not change people's ideas or actions but it is worth \$5 million to play a 30 second ad during the Super Bowl. If TV doesn't change our minds and actions why are commercials so expensive?

To cut down on activities we think are dangerous, especially to children, ads for tobacco are banned and ads for candy and fast food are regulated. People think ads can convince young people to do things that can hurt them. So remind me again why it is wrong to regulate what is shown on TV and at what times?

I tend to like two kinds of shows, children's cartoons and violent shows like *Walking Dead* and *Game of Thrones*. Cartoons have gotten much better since I was a kid. In my youth Hanna-Barbera used the same *Scooby Doo* animations in every episode. They also had multiple *Scooby Doo* knock offs — *JabberJaws, Captain Caveman, Speed Buggy,* were all shows about a group of teens solving mysteries along with a talking shark, a superhero caveman, and a talking dune buggy respectively.

Today there are a lot of really original and very entertaining cartoons. Likewise, shows aimed at adults have become more original, but also more violent and reveal more skin. TV shows are not like *Adam 12* or *I Love Lucy* anymore.

When I had kids at home, I tried to limit the shows they watched. The TV can change how we think and the TV shows a very strange and not at all realistic vision of the world. On TV, the world is meaner, more dangerous, and more violent. Every third person on TV is a murderer or a vampire, or a vampire murderer. In real life there are jerks, but most people will go out of their way to help you.

Our politicians raise billions of dollars for a successful presidential campaign and tens of millions to run for governor or senator. Virtually all that money goes to TV commercials. So someone thinks that TV can change people's minds. I find political ads to be especially corrosive. Political ads are mostly negative. The ad has ominous music so we feel the politician being attacked is a close ally to the greatest villains of history. In the last blitz for the N.H. primary, one idea formed from all the ads. The idea that stuck in my head was, "NO ONE IS TO BE TRUST-ED." (This ad was sponsored by some campaign or super PAC.) All the politicians running were not to be trusted, according to a competing campaign. No wonder politicians as a class are so maligned. They do it to themselves. All we get to do is vote for the lesser of two evils.

But what if like the world, politicians on TV are meaner, dumber, and more corrupt than they are in real life? Is it possible most of these people would be good at running the nation? Except for that one candidate you hate, of course.

Good luck and may the candidate you support win in the primary on March 1.

The children have started talking about Easter already. We will be coloring, eating and searching for eggs.


