FROM THE PASTOR

"And a Child Will Lead Them"

This month we start Lent with our normal service on Ash Wednesday, March 6, at 7PM. We will also be having our Lenten series on Jesus using the film *The Miracle Maker*. We will watch parts of the movie following a meal of soup and sandwiches. The Lenten series begins at 6 and ends by 7.

This year we will be viewing a stop motion animated film on the life of Jesus. I consider this the most accurate, to the Bible, film on the life of Jesus I have seen. I especially like how the film presents the parables.

Many of you know I like cartoons. I think good programing for children can get to the core of a story better than programs aimed only at adults. When telling a story to a child, a lot of the tricks used to hide a bad story from adults can't be used. Children aren't impressed by the same things adults are impressed by.

Too often children's programs are horrible because they assume their audience are idiots. (I think that is also true of many adult programs.) But a good children's program can be quite powerful.

Jesus had a special love for children.

¹³ Then little children were being brought to him in order that he might lay his hands on them and pray. The disciples spoke sternly to those who brought them; ¹⁴ but Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs." ¹⁵ And he laid his hands on them and went on his way.*

And . . .

At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" ² He called a child, whom he put among them, ³ and said, "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. ⁴ Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. ⁵ Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me.**

So it is important that we adults be open to the spirit of a child. I hope watching and talking about a Jesus movie meant for kids will give us all a new insight into the ministry of Jesus.

The Music Search Committee is actively seeking to fill the position of Organist/Choir Director. The job of the organist/choir director serves to support and enhance the worship services and music program within our Church.

Skills and Qualifications: Ability to play proficiently various styles of music on organ and piano; ability to recruit, direct, and motivate volunteer adult and junior church choirs; ability to select music for purchase and presentation. Ability to work as a team leader/team member and communicate well with co-workers, choirs, and congregation. A degree or certificate from a certified music education program is preferred; basic knowledge of congregational worship is preferred.

Responsibilities: Provide organ or piano musical solos or accompaniment before, during, and following regular Sunday morning services and for other special services, e.g. Christmas Eve, Easter, Lenten, Ecumenical. Conduct weekly choir rehearsals, and prepare the choir(s) for special services. Coordinate with the minister to plan worship services. Work with the Music Committee on annual music budget, annual report, and instrument maintenance. Play for weddings and funerals held at the church. (Personal schedule will be considered.) Communicate with church secretary on anthems for publication in the weekly program and for copying as needed. Maintain music library/collection in an accessible and orderly format. Coordinate/communicate with the Director of Religious Education and parents on rehearsals and monthly/special performances of the Jr. Choir. Comply with our Child Protection Policy.





A funeral service was held here on Friday, February 22, 2019. Burial will be held in private.
