Recently I spent several hours as a patient in the emergency room of a city hospital. I was not in imminent danger of death and I did not come to the hospital in an ambulance, so I ranked fairly low on the priority list of the medical staff, and rightly so. I was, however, in some considerable pain as my tear-streaked face made clear to all who passed. No cubicles were available to me, so I sat on a gurney in a busy hallway watching the staff pass me by for several hours before I received pain medication.

Needless to say, I've had better nights. In the midst of the painful waiting, however, God showed up in the person of a young woman, an EMT by the badge on her jacket. She probably brought someone to the ER in her ambulance and was now walking through my hallway on the way out. She undoubtedly had much on her mind and important work to do. But she saw the pain in my face, and though she did not work in the ER, she took a moment to stop and ask me if I was going to be all right. She told me to hold on, that someone would help me. She gently touched my shoulder and looked in my eyes. She made a difference with a small gift: a touch, a word of comfort. Small gifts count!


ESTATE PLANNING?

BACK TO HAITI

As you may or may not know, Randy and I will be returning to Haiti this fall (October $3^{rd} - 12^{th}$). We will be traveling with Monadnock Bible Conference again, but this time we will be part of a medical mission that provides free medical care to the people of Haiti. In Haiti you have to pay "up front" for any medical care. The clinics provided by MBC may be the only care these people receive. It is also quite common for collections to be taken from the missions team to provide for surgical procedures that can not be performed by the clinics themselves such as hernias, abscesses and other more in depth treatments. We will also be spending some time with the orphans from Redeemer's Child Orphanage and checking out the progress on the new orphanage we broke ground on last November.

"MBC ministries, are mercy and compassion based but do not diminish or lack the power of the gospel. At MBC we see it as counterintuitive and disingenuous to see a brother or sister in need and say, 'Go, I wish you well. Keep warm and well fed' and yet do nothing about it. The Haitians have a proverb; 'sak vid pa kanpe' an empty sack doesn't stand up, meaning a hungry person can't do anything. This person is so overwhelmed by their condition that words are seldom heard, but actions are understood. As we meet physical needs (hunger, thirst, naked, sick . . .) we have the opportunity to speak to spiritual needs in Jesus' name."

As the time for our trip draws closer, we **may** take up a collection for some over the counter medications and such, but right now what we really need is our church's help to get there. The Outreach Committee has generously donated \$500 for our trip deposits, but we still need to raise a minimum of another \$2200 (maybe more depending on what the on going crisis in the Mid East does to gas prices and therefore airfare). We are so grateful for your ongoing support and love.

Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

Whether we are longtime Christians struggling with the temptations and stress of today's world or new believers reaching out for the first time to Christ to transform our lives, this book can point us to the secrets for living happier, more meaningful lives. How does the title, "Living the Extraordinary Life" strike you? Is the pace of life's treadmill too fast for you? – Yes? – That's a common answer and author and Pastor, Dr. Charles Stanley, may be renowned in his field, but he is fast to agree that life can bring you to an abyss – that you

can experience a descent from a spiritual mountain peak to a pit which lacks an escape. The mental visions he shares in this book are gems fostered by extensive study of the Scriptures and then put through "tests on earth." To quote the Pastor, "Throughout my life I have come to understand one thing clearly: only God can help you to live a truly extraordinary life."

From personal experience, biblical personalities and true case studies, Dr. Stanley shows how nine (9) life principles he references in the book will guide our souls in this confused age. Every chapter contains useful help such as prayers and questions which will serve as a guide in journaling daily progress from weakness to strength, from desperation to confidence in God's power and love. Using the following of life's principles, we can

- a.) Find out how we can replace fear with faith
- b.) Learn the power packed secret of waiting on God
- c.) Discover that discouragement is a choice
- d.) Access God's power to cope when our stamina is gone.

Just what is this extraordinary life God calls us to enjoy? It's a life that cannot be waived by inner sorrows or disappointments. As defined by Dr. Stanley, it is "a life sustained by inner peace and joy in the good times and the bad. He further thinks that "God wants us to experience fulfillment." That God created us for excellence and from His perspective, our lives present infinite possibilities. No matter how many wrong turns we take, God knows how to redirect our lives and set us back on the right track. That's what "Living the Extraordinary Life" is all about. It is a revelation of renewed hope for all who have almost run out of strength and faith. It's a stabilizing and confidence-building message for those of us who live in uncertain times.


Dr. Stanley has been Pastor of a large Baptist Church in Georgia and head of the International In Touch Ministries, including his *In Touch* radio and television programs.

From the Church Historians ...

The following is an excerpt from a ledger that was stored in the Town Hall basement. It outlines step-by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town.

> George DuHamel & Paula Lubin Church Historians

To Mr. Alexander Nichols, Constable of Ward

Greetings in the name of the Government and people of Massachusetts Bay you are hereby required forthwith to warn ye freeholders and other inhabitants of the Town of Ward qualified to vote in town affairs to meet at the public meeting house in said town on Monday the twentieth day of September next at one of the clock in the afternoon.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for Said meeting.
- 2. To raise money to support preaching.
- 3. To choose a Committee to divide the Town of Ward into proper squadrons for convenient schooling and to act on any thing relative to schooling that the Town may think proper.
- 4. To see whither the Town will adopt ve proceedings of the late Convention at Worcester respecting Commerce and to act anything relative thereto that they may be thought proper.
- 5. To see what measurers the Town will take respecting finishing the meeting house and act as may be thought necessary respecting said affair.

Hereof fail not but make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon unto some of us the subscribers on or before the time of s'd meeting.

Given under our hands & seal at Ward this third day of August A.D. 1779


