#### FROM THE PASTOR

I have been thinking about kids moving out into the world. It is a natural topic with Confirmation winding down and Confirmation Sunday being May 5. Confirmation was an early step into adulthood. Children were confirmed just as they entered their teen years. Which was also the time that boys and girls entered service or started apprenticeships.

In Europe and America it was common for boys and girls to leave their homes at 12 or 13 to go live in another house to learn what they needed to do to be adults. I left home a little before my 15th birthday to go to boarding school; I imagine that was similar. Boarding school exposed me to a lot of different experiences. I learned putting on dirty clothes is worse than doing laundry. I learned sleep is very important and going to sleep before you have to is a wise thing to do (sometimes).

Today, this age is when we go from small neighborhood elementary schools to larger middle or high schools. This is the way of humans. We go from family to neighborhood to eventually the whole wide world.

I have lamented the lack of kids in my neighborhood. Many kids are kept inside where it is safe. At home they are out of danger, or so we think.

A big question is: "When should a child have a phone?" A phone is nice for parents to get a hold of their kid, but... a phone also opens the world up to the kid. Or possibly exposes the kid to adult stuff they are not ready for.

I am of the age that it was normal for me to walk into a dozen houses in my neighborhood without needing to knock. These were places I could get a cup of water or a band aid for a skinned knee or even a full meal. These were also people who knew precisely what time my mom got home from work and would call her as she came in the door to tell her what they had seen me doing which they knew was against the rules.

Now things were not all roses. Along with the houses that I was welcome in, were the houses I was to avoid. Houses even where some of my friends lived.

"You are NEVER to go into Todd's house EVER. Do you understand?"

"Yes mom. But why?"

Only as an adult did I figure out that Todd's parents were not trusted or were known not to be safe around kids.

I hope you pray for our confirmands as they take another step into adulthood. Adulthood can be a long, difficult place to get to. Have you gotten there yet?



#### **IMPORTANT — PLEASE NOTE:**

The Church Council has approved the implementation of a new fundraising policy. Fundraisers are broken down as follows: **major fundraisers** (with proceeds greater than \$1,000 that require church space for more than one day), **small fundraisers** (proceeds less than \$1,000 that need church space for one day or less), and **coffee hour fundraisers** (only run in fellowship hall during Sunday coffee hour). Major fundraisers require both Trustee and Council approval at least 3 months prior to the event. Small fundraisers require Trustee and Council approval at least 1 month in advance. Coffee hour fundraisers require approval by the Church Council or Council President.

If you are involved with any fundraising, please familiarize yourself with the policy and request form well in advance of your fundraiser in order to meet specified deadlines. Copies of the policy and attached request form are available on the table in fellowship hall or by calling the church office, 508-832-2845, and requesting that a copy be mailed to you.
