Christian Outreach and Service Projects

Our confirmation curriculum requires each confirmand to undertake a service project. The purpose of this requirement is to demonstrate the variety of ways that Christians can use their talents and interests to reach out into the community and provide services in Christ's name. The confirmand chooses an agency that interests them and then provides five hours of service to them. Then they return to spend five hours planning, publicizing, and preparing ways in which the church can help them provide the service. This is to teach the confirmands that the church community cares about their outreach ministry and supports them.


The outreach committee, faced with a 35% decrease in funding, is looking for ways to grow our outreach ministry in the face of these cuts.



Also, if you have a yearly flower order, please let me know as I have started a list.



Choir Tidings

Palm Sunday and Easter will be music filled services with three anthems to be sung at each service. On Palm Sunday you will hear 'The Palms' by Faure, 'The Lord Comes' and 'On That Day When He Rode into Jerusalem'. 'The Palms' will be sung as a solo by Rev. Knox' talented son Dana. This is actually an enormous work originally written for a full orchestra and 100 voice choir.

'On That Day' is specifically written for Passion Sunday. It was quite challenging to bring together due to the many tempo changes and key changes throughout the work. You will certainly not be bored listening to this one!

'The Lord Comes' is a new anthem for us written for Advent or Palm Sunday. The text is based on Luke 19:40 and Matthew 21:9. It is a bit unusual for an Advent anthem in that it is quite upbeat.

For Easter Sunday, the two choirs will join together to sing 'Halle, Hallelujah' and 'Christ is Risen! Alleluia!' Both anthems will be divided into two parts with the youth taking one part and the adults another. These anthems are wonderfully appropriate for an adult/youth mix which is why we've done them before! As could be expected, both are joyful and up tempo.

'A Peaceful Alleluia' will be sung by the adults only. Although we will have several people missing this Easter, this anthem will be sung in three parts. For those of you who enjoy Pachabels Canon, you will find a similar style and familiarity here. We have a wealth of music coming up; I'm sure there is something for everyone!

Minister of Christian Education

Loren Eiseley, a naturalist, tells a story about a star thrower. While he was in the seaside town of Costabel he was plagued by insomnia and so he spent the early morning hours walking the beach. Each day at sunrise, he found townspeople combing the sand for starfish, which had washed ashore during the night, to kill them for commercial purposes. Eiseley thought this was a sign, however small, of all the ways the world says "NO" to life.

One morning, however, Eiseley got up unusually early, and discovered a solitary figure on the beach. This man, too, was gathering starfish, but each time he found one alive he would pick it up and throw it as far as he could out beyond the breaking surf, back to the nurturing ocean from which it came. As days went by, Eiseley found this man embarked on his mission of mercy each morning, seven days a week, no matter the weather.

Eiseley called this man "The Star Thrower." On the beach in Costabel, that one man contradicted everything that Eiseley had been taught about evolution and the survival of the fittest. For this man, strong as he was, reached down to save the weak. Eiseley wondered if there was a star-thrower at work in the universe, a God who contradicts death, a God whose nature is mercy itself.

During this season of Lent, our focus is on the Cross. This cross is one of the ways that human beings said "No" to life. And yet, through the cross of Jesus, God says a resounding "YES" to life. Through this cross of Jesus, God reaches down to save us from ourselves. Through this cross of Jesus, God rescues us from certain death—he hurls us back into the fullness of life. And he invites us to take up our crosses and follow him—to become star throwers ourselves, cherishing life for all people. Through the cross of Jesus, God invites us to join our voices with his in a resounding "Yes" to life. Who do you know who needs to feel the love and hope that God gives us through Jesus? Be a Star Thrower and rescue them by sharing the Good News that Jesus Saves!






