On October 14th we celebrated the baptism of Cooper Wilson Tomaszewicz. Cooper is the $5\frac{1}{2}$ month old son of Keith and Courtney Tomaszewicz. We pray God's blessing upon Cooper and his family.

Hearing Assistance System

The hearing system now installed is a Williams Sound System. This company was founded by the first individual to design a system specifically to help a church parishioner to hear a sermon back in 1975. It was the first sermon she could hear after attending the church for three years. The company grew from this first experiment. I find it impressive in this day and age that they back the transmitter and receivers with a 5 year warranty.

The transmitter has 17 different channels that can be changed if there is radio interference. An unlimited number of receivers can be used with the one transmitter. The transmitter is currently set on channel E which is 72.9 MHz. The 6 receivers that came with the initial system are tuned to this frequency. If we order additional receivers we should request them tuned to this frequency, although they can be changed after receipt.

The system came with ear buds with foam covers. These can be washed with a mild solution of laundry detergent, air dried, and reused. Replacements can also be ordered, and we currently have 6 spares. We also bought three neckloop receivers that a person with a telecoil-equipped hearing aid can just place around their neck to hear through their own hearing aids.

There will not be one headset that will be best for all users. I have printed out and placed information on some of the Williams units in a hearing assistance folder. We recommend that constant users have their own ear piece or headset, if they do not use one of the neckloops. If they currently have one that has a 3.5mm (1/8") mono plug they can use that. It does not need to be a Williams product. They could also use a stereo ear piece or headset with the same size plug but only one side would work. Individuals could also order their own personal receiver for around \$95 plus shipping if they wish.

For those who have hearing aids, the neckloop, a headset, or an ear piece that stays outside of the ear are the options.

The six receivers and the three neckloops makes us ADA compliant for a seating of 150 people. 175 would require a 6th receiver, and 200 would require a 7th. With our current congregation we may need additional receivers based upon usage, not just ADA requirements.

I am sure questions will come up as we implement this new system and I will be happy to discuss this with anyone. I have also ordered some of the other ear pieces so individuals can see or try them out.

I would like to thank the Trustees who authorized the funds from the sound and hearing system account to support this project, and the donation from the Memorial Committee that covered the balance to make the installation possible.

Who Are These People?

Peaceful Heroes — *With Our Children We Long for Heroes, With Our Children We Long for Peace* by Jonah Winter; illustrated by Sean Addy

This is a book for the <u>family</u>. Winter and Addy, inspired by the 14 people listed above and their hopes, have given us another source of making the world a better place, a tribute to bravery and peace. The significance of the word HERO, since 2500 years ago, has generally applied to a person of distinguished character and courage, especially as a warrior who fought with a shield and sword or a bow and arrow. The same character and courage, but non-violent and peaceful methods, are sought by today's heroes. The intent may be to die for, not kill for, a cause.

You probably recognized at least half of the names in the beginning. In contrast, several may have been new to you for the first time, and are there any new thoughts expressed? Your comments are always welcome and can be shared.

Already in the Adult Library in DVD form, is *Six Million Paper Clips*. Bringing it into meaningful focus again at this time, it is "interwoven" with facts on the Holocaust which is less known to today's students. Everyone of those paper clips represented a victim of the Nazis' extermination of this incredible number of Jewish people. Authors, Peter and Dagmar Schroeder, chose this unique way to reveal the vastness of the tragedy — with 16,000,000 paper clips — by filling a World War II German rail car and placing it in front of a middle school in the town of 1600 people in Whitwell, Tennessee. Its message — teaching tolerance!

This book, *Celebrate Thanksgiving with Turkey, Family and Counting Blessings* (A Holiday Around the World — National Geographic Book) by Deborah Heiligman, includes just about, if not all, of what's related to this ultimate American holiday. She (Deborah) includes information from Sarah Josepha Hale, the magazine editor, who spent 40 years campaigning to make Thanksgiving a national holiday. The Pilgrims, with 90 Indians, celebrated for 3 days. Some of the information includes the Native American Prayer. While the U.S. celebrates it on the 4th Thursday in November, Canada celebrates Thanksgiving on the 2nd Monday in October.

Also within the pages of *Celebrate Thanksgiving with Turkey, Family and Counting Blessings* there's a recipe for Phil Pa's cranberry and peach preserves (sounds good); a few Thanksgiving books for reference and websites, and Dr. Elizabeth Pleck's article entitled *Thanksgiving: Its Meaning and Traditions.* It's worth borrowing this book for the pictures alone.

Do Hungry People Ring Your Doorbell?

Do hungry people ring your doorbell? This is a common occurrence in my life. Last week, an elderly woman rang the doorbell right at dusk. It was cold out, and I ran to answer thinking it was one of the girls who had forgotten her keys. "Would you have something you could give me to eat?" she asked me politely. Our pantry was nearly empty, because Acsa, the nursing student who lives with me, had not yet been to the store for the week. I found a box of macaroni and cheese and took it to the gate. She received the box with heartfelt thanks.

A second after I closed the door, the doorbell rang again. "Can you tell me how to cook this?" asked the same lady. "I don't know how to read," she added. I read the instructions on the box for her.

Yesterday it was right after lunch. We had guests and no leftovers. I answered the door when the bell rang. This time it was a young man with dreadlocks. He looked confused when I asked, in the traditional way, "¿En qué le puedo server?" (How might I be of service to you?) He could not look directly at me as he mumbled, "What can I do? I am hungry." I asked him to wait a minute. Acsa helped me prepare a cheese sandwich, a cup of hot tea, and an apple. Again he did not look at me as I gave him the food, but he said "thank-you" softly and placed the sandwich, the cup, and the apple in an old paint bucket and walked away.

I rarely see the people twice, and have often wondered if someone has put a secret mark on our house or if people work their way through the whole neighbourhood until they get to ours. The answer came to me last year, on an icy day, when a barefoot, toothless, shaggy haired young man rang the doorbell. He frightened Carolina, my other house mate, and at the same time sparked her compassion. She called me to the door. "I am hungry," he stated in a childlike voice, "and I want to go home." I opened the gate and went and sat next to him on the curb. He told me his long sad story of abuse and loneliness. Carolina prepared some food as I listened. I gave him the five dollars he said he needed for the bus home. We got him a warm pair of socks and a jacket, too. He smiled and exclaimed excitedly, "I just knew that at this house I would find someone who loves God! I can see in your eyes that you do." I guess God has marked our house. Has God marked yours?
