So, what's up with the INTENTIONAL bit?

Reflections from your INTENTIONAL Interim Pastor, Rev. Mark Seifried

"When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, 'It's going to rain'; and so it happens. And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, 'There will be scorching heat'; and it happens. You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?" (Luke 12:54-56 and Matthew 16:2-3)

This passage is both an indictment and an invitation. It indicts Jesus' audience (us and those who heard it 2000+ years ago) as blind to what is happening, even as it invites them (and us!) to look again, to see anew. That really is the theme of the interim time: to look again and see anew!

During the interim time, we don't take as much for granted as we do during the settled pastorate. In my last *Tidings* article, I told you that I ask a lot of questions at the start up of the interim so that I can learn about you, the institution you built (*you* being a member of the church!), and the needs of the wider community. The interim time also gives you time to ask a lot of questions. The church actually promised to seek answers to certain questions, during the interim time we will ask together. Those questions are in the covenant made between the congregation and me. I have framed them below:

What is our history? What is the best and the worst of our congregation's history? What lessons did we learn along the way? What should we avoid repeating? What from our past shall we carry forward to bless the future ministries and mission?

What is or shall be new about our identity? How has God changed us over the years? What are our strengths and weaknesses of the congregation? What does the wider community need from us so that we remain a vital part of Auburn and the region? To what ministries is God calling us? What beliefs and practices have emerged that make us a community of faith? What are the mission and vision that will drive the church?

How will we manage shifts of leadership? Will people who are tired just quit? Who will take their place and how? What type of training do they need? What do we need to let go of to allow new leaders to emerge? What are the spiritual gifts in the community? How will we manage the inevitable conflict as power shifts? How will we bless new leaders and thank those who have faithfully served for many years? How will the seasoned leaders and the less experienced leaders work together?

What are our denominational covenants? Are there resources at the regional, state or national level which would enhance our ministries in Auburn? Do we know how our dues and mission dollars are being spent? Are we spending too much or too little on mission partnerships? Are we committed to ecumenical and interfaith relationships? What do those relations look like? How shall we communicate with the wider church to maintain healthy relations and provide for blessed covenant in the future?

Are we committed to new leadership and a new future? Are we stable enough to call another settled pastor? Have we allowed the former pastor to truly retire as our pastor – emotionally? Do church members share the sense of common goals and achievements as we move forward? What kind of leaders, including pastoral, do we need to accomplish our mission? What will the church look and feel like in 5 to 10 years?

Together, over the next months; and perhaps years, we will *intentionally* interpret the signs that are around us. We will *intentionally* pursue the purpose God has for us. We will *intentionally* become aware of the presence of Christ in our midst. We will *intentionally* call upon the power of the Holy Spirit to energize our ministries. Together, we will *intentionally* discover the new day to which God calls the church - with joy and thanksgiving. That is my prayer. Please pray with me and for our shared ministry as we *intentionally* move ahead ... to the glory of God.



Here We Grow

Here We Grow Preschool has just begun to provide its 20th year of operation. The program was started in 1989, as an outreach program of First Congregational Church for young families with children living in and around the community. The school opened its doors with an enrollment of eight children and two teachers and has grown to a staff of 9 teachers, a full time director and enrollment of 134 children. HWG is housed in the lower level of Fellowship Hall using 3 classrooms and the fourth classroom shared with Sunday School. We offer Monday/ Wednesday/Friday, Tuesday/Thursday, and Tuesday/Wednesday/Thursday classes and a Monday through Friday extended day class. HWG is licensed by the Department of Early Education and Care (DEEC) and has received the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) accreditation.

LEDGER

1773-1786

A few years ago I read and copied a ledger that was stored in the town hall basement. I don't believe this book has been read in the last two hundred years. It is a complete record of the step-by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town.

The following is the fourth in a series of excerpts from these writings.

George DuHamel and Paula Lubin, Church Historians

Woregster Sa. To Jacob Stevens, Clark of the parish in the Southweat part of Woregster and the parts of the towns attached belonging to Said parish. You are hear by required in his magicastees name fourth with to notify and warn all the freeholders and other inhabitance qualified according to the law to vot in town affairs belonging to Said parish to met at the Dwelling hous of Thomas Drury innholder of Woreester in said Parish on this Day the tenth Day of march next at one of the clock in the afternone to vote on the following articles. Article 1 to choose a Moderator foresaid meeting.

- 2 to chose Parish clerk.
- 3 to chose all Parish officers as the Law Directs.
- 4 to grant money if they see cauc to Pay for Preaching and other necessary youses for the benefit of the parish the year gusing.
- 5 to chose one or more Suitable persons to go to the general cort and return the names of those persons that have Signed & order of court invenne the courts order.
- 6 To see if the parish will build a porch or porches to the parish meeting house or act thereon as they shall think Proper.

7 to know the minds of the parish whether they will build a convenant plais for to hang a Bell on the meting hous upon condition it becosen by Subscuption or act thereon as they Shall see caus.

You re hear by ordered to wrn the injabatitants of the above Said Parish by posting a true attested copy of this worent at the above Said Publick hous and make return of this worent to one on majestries on or before the our of meting on the tenth Pay of march next at one of the clock in the afternoon.

Given under our hands an Seal this twenty fifth Day of February one thousen Seven hundred and Seventy four an in the fourteenth year of his majestries heirs.

News from Outreach

On Saturday, October 18th the church lawn/pumpkin patch will be the place to be! From 10 to 2 we are planning to serve coffee, donuts, and cider in the morning and then hot dogs and rolls with coffee and cider at noon.

The Heifer Project will provide a small petting zoo.

Children will be able to make haunted houses. (We only have supplies for 100 houses so please sign up by calling

The cost to make a house is \$5 per child (in families with 3 or more children the first two children will be \$5 and each additional child will be charged \$3). Remember our overall goal is to build an ark with pairs of several different kinds of animals. These animals will provide families with a steady source of nourishment and income.

Managing through Change.... MISSION: POSSIBLE

Throughout the fall of 2008, we will delve a little deeper into the various ministries of our Church. Being constant in our Faith and serving others through our ministries is one way in helping us to keep in step with our Lord.

The Church bulletin for September 21st gave us some insight into the Parish Nurse Ministry within First Congregational Church of Auburn. Some of the programs offered are geared toward FCC members while others are offered at a regional level. We thank God for the talents He has given Deb Pranaitis, our Parish Nurse for approximately 9 years, which allow her to be such an advocate for our elderly as well as all the ways in which she helps our congregation and others in our local area.

September 28th's article will give us a little insight into the goings -on of the yearly Confirmation Class of FCC. The Confirmation Class is under the direction of the Board of Education with the Lead Teacher being the Minister and its goal is a reaffirmation of Christian Faith through study and outreach for any youth 9 th grade and above. One of the outreach programs the students are involved in is "City Reach," which is when the students make an overnight trip into Boston to feed and fellowship with the homeless in the city. It's a humbling experience for our youth who, under normal circumstances of everyday life, may never come in contact with a homeless person.

The following week will have us journeying into the activities of our Youth on a Mission (YOM). FCC's YOM group has been active for 5 years. The "mission" of this group is to provide voluntary community service. The group's primary service has been rehabilitation of homes and churches but although this is the case, the aim of the group is outreach. YOM trips include Jonesville, VA (2004), Wheeling, WV (2005), Hunterville, WV (2006), Pipeville, KY (2007) and Asheville, NC (Summer, 2008). YOM is not a line item in the Church's budget and relies solely on fundraising events and donations to provide what they need for their outreach activities. While planning their fundraising events which include an annual spring auction, the youths and their mentors also enjoy many social events such as bowling, plays, and cookouts.

Throughout the many changes we have endured this year, First Congregational Church of Auburn has remained very active in its various ministries. In your prayers, remember to thank our Lord for all that he provides so that we can continue to be faithful to Him.

MONDAY NIGHTS AT THE CHURCH


