A Hard Summer

This summer I have paid more attention to the news. Why was that? There is war in Ukraine in which Russia is supplying the "rebels" with high altitude anti-aircraft missiles that resulted in the destruction of an airline jet. Those missiles require radar trucks and a lot of other support vehicles to work. I doubt rebels could run such a complex missile system. As I write this, there are reports Russian trained "volunteers" have crossed into Ukraine in an armored column.

There is war in Iraq and Syria with a group too extreme for Al Qaeda. A group I never heard of is on the brink of genocide while trapped on a mountain in the desert.

Hamas in Gaza and Israel fought another battle that neither had any chance of winning. Hamas is too weak to defeat Israel and is too good at hiding for Israel to find and defeat them without causing a massacre of Palestinian civilians.

There was another police shooting of an unarmed man that sparked rioting in an American town. When I hear the chant, "No justice, no peace!" I pray for both. Too often peace is really apathy and justice is too often revenge. An eye for an eye will only leave the world blind. True peace and true justice do not come into the world often. Justice and peace are hard to get and easy to lose.

There is a large Ebola outbreak in West Africa; Ebola kills between 65-70% of the people it infects. I heard one country has gone from having 200 doctors for 4 million people to having only 50 doctors for 4 million people. The U.S. has almost 10,000 doctors per 4 million people.

All these problems seem too big to solve. We are just normal people. We spend most of our energy working our jobs, taking care of our families, and finding a little time to rest. There is no way we can fix what is wrong in this world. Not necessarily true. A silly game of dumping Ice water on yourself has raised over \$12 million more for ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease) than was raised last year (as of August 17). People will forget the videos, but if a scientist finds a cure due to a grant from the money the ice buckets generated, that will be a miraculous outcome.

There are things we can do to make the world better. Small things. But many small things become huge things. After all, the great oceans are just a bunch of tiny rain drops.

This month we start Sunday School and Confirmation. If you have a young person entering 8th grade or higher they are eligible for Confirmation. Please call the church so we can be sure to have enough materials for everyone.

On September 14 we will celebrate the 90th anniversary of our Boy Scout Troop 101. Imagine how much good those boys and men have done over the decades.

Looking forward to October we have pumpkins arriving Saturday, the 4th, and the Church Fair on Oct. 11th & 12th. There are many ways you can help the world. I hope you see helping our church as one way to make the world better.

Rev. Knox served as a Congregational Minister for the United Church of Christ for 44 years, first in the East Woodstock Congregational Church of Woodstock, CT (1964-1972), the Talcottville Congregational Church of Vernon, CT (1972-1984) and the First Congregational Church of Auburn, MA (1984-2008) where he retired from, but remained Pastor Emeritus. He served on many Auburn town committees including as Chairman of the Cemetery Commission. He also served as the Chaplain of the Auburn Fire Department for many years. He loved trains, as his grandfather was an engineer for the Boston & Maine Railroad, and he enjoyed riding with his grandfather. Ken and Jackie enjoyed summers on Boyden Lake in Robbinston, Maine.

A memorial service in celebration of Rev. Knox's life of service was held on Saturday, August 9, here at First Congregational Church. Burial, in Hillside Cemetery, was held privately.

What is Relay For Life?

The American Cancer Society Relay for Life is a life-changing event that gives everyone in communities across the globe a chance to <u>celebrate</u> the lives of people who have battled cancer, <u>remember</u> loved ones lost, and <u>fight back</u> against the disease. At Relay, teams of people camp out at a local high school, park, or fairground and take turns walking or running around a track or path. Each team is asked to have a representative on the track at all times during the event. Because cancer never sleeps, Relays are overnight events up to 24 hours in length.

Relay began in 1985 when Dr. Gordy Klatt*, a colorectal surgeon in Tacoma, Washington, ran and walked around a track for 24 hours to raise money for the American Cancer Society. Since then, Relay has grown from a single man's passion to fight cancer, into the world's largest movement to end the disease. Each year, more than 3.5 million people in 5,000 communities in the United States, along with additional communities in 19 other countries, gather to take part in this global phenomenon and raise much-needed funds and awareness to save lives from cancer. Thanks to Relay participants, we are creating a world with more birthdays, a world where cancer can't claim another year of anyone's life. We invite all cancer survivors in the community to attend Relay For Life because they are the reason we Relay.
