From the Pulpit

This summer a By-law Review Committee has been reviewing the Constitution and By-laws of the church to make suggestions to the church about any changes that might help us better reflect the ideals and practices of the church in this very basic document.

Our issue that has provoked serious discussion is the section defining membership in First Congregational Church, its rights and responsibilities. In the best of all situations members would take their responsibilities very seriously, fulfilling the commitment made at the time they joined the church.

The constitution includes the covenant that binds us together as a congregation of God's people. It is a promise made to God, Jesus Christ, and the other members of the church to be faithful to one's responsibilities.

The Covenant of First Congregational Church

We covenant with the Lord and with one another and do bind ourselves together in professing Christian belief and purpose, in promising to prayerfully study the Bible as our rule of faith and practice, in striving after holiness of heart and entire conformity of life to requirements of God's Word, in consecrating ourselves, our time, talents, and treasures to the strengthening of the cause of Christ around us and its establishment in the whole world. Amen.

In the By-laws there is a further definition of membership:

Article II

Section 3. Responsibilities

Members are expected to be faithful in all spiritual duties essential to the Christian life:

- 1) To attend regularly the services of the church;
- 2) To share in its organized work;
- 3) To give systematically for its support and its benevolences;
- 4) In case of removal to other communities, to request letters of transfer to other churches.

I have come to the understanding that those members who seldom participate or support the church are exerting a negative power on the life of the church. It makes the church weaker, less effective, less involved, less caring than God intends it to be. While the church still does much with all of our members involved to the degree they can be involved, First Congregational Church could be so much more powerful in outreach and ministry. We could be much more effective in doing God's will for it, and much more involved in sharing the gospel in word and deed with our community.

We need every member doing all they promised God they would do. That will help our church become all that God wants it to be and everything you would like it to be.

Come, join us this fall. You are wanted. You are needed!

As you may know, the Treasurer's position is a paid position that offers an annual salary of \$1,000. When offered this position last spring, my fulltime job was in jeopardy as my company was being acquired by a competitor and huge layoffs were expected. Through God's grace, I was able to survive the 62% workforce reduction at my plant. Therefore I will not be accepting a salary for the Treasurer's position, as I feel that First Congregational Church needs this money (more than me) to fund it's many ministries and outreach programs. Summer isn't over. Don't let those retail promotions snatch away these last days with less humidity and cool stargazing nights with a s'more in hand.

Wait a minute! Time to shift gears. This is supposed to be a promo for church libraries. Some very interesting books were given this summer so maybe it's a great time to set a fall pace and habit of reading for a while before "turning in".

Among books gifted by Marilyn Plue is The House on Nauset Marsh by Wyman Richardson. Though it's first couple of pages are upside down, the book became one of the greatest classics not only of Cape Cod literature but of all nature writings. Sterling North wrote a while ago that the whole flavor and mood of Outer Cape Cod were caught up in this memorable book. It's last copyright was in '72 but don't let that deter you from making a few updated comments on a good book for us to pass along to other readers.

Another of Marilyn's gifts is Love, Medicine and Miracles by Bernie S. Siegel, M.D. It's a former N.Y. Times #1 best seller which one of our caring parishioners gifted to those who were going through critical physical trials. To take a quote from a notable proponent of the book, "It explains how you can think yourself sick or well. It can be a lifesaver."

Hopefully the change in seasons will have no influence on the enthusiasm for reading another M.P. gift titled The Enduring Shore by Paul Schneider. In fact this irresistible biographical history of New England's vacation paradise Cape Cod, Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket might be a great antidote for a blizzard. Esquire it's a charged must read for anyone who ever fell asleep in American History.

Gayle Farley, as manager of the gift shop at Tower Hill (you didn't know that did you?) sees and buys lots of books. This summer she chose two to gift. God In The Garden by Maureen Gilmore is a lovely week by week journey through the Christian year. On books like this you can borrow them for a bit longer and may want to photocopy certain parts. Just mention it to us. Herbs of the Bible is described as 2000 years of plant and medicine. It's author, James A. Duke, Ph D also wrote Green Pharmacy.

A big thank you to Marilyn, Gayle and all of you who have given books and continue to do so. We are requesting that NO BOOKS BE GIVEN ANNONYMOUSLY. Mission Moment

It All Began with Prayer, a Storm and a Haystack

O n an August afternoon in 1806, five Williams College students met in a field to talk, to pray and, like so many young people, to dream of a better world. When a sudden thunderstorm interrupted, they sought shelter under a haystack— and there resolved to offer their lives to carry their faith into service into "all the world." This gathering came to be called the Haystack Prayer Meeting, launching the modern mission movement.

By 1810, America's first foreign mission society, the American Board of Commissioners of Foreign Missions, was formed by Congregationalists in Massachusetts. In 1812 it sent its first five missionaries to India. By the end of the century missionaries had been sent to the Near East, including Turkey and Palestine, the Sandwich Islands, China, and Africa.

What did these missionaries do? They translated the Bible into difficult and often previously unwritten languages. They built educational systems in their lands of ministry and were often called upon to advise foreign governments. They established schools and hospitals in all the mission fields. They trained native leaders to continue the work of the ministry.

After 150 years, the American Board had sent out nearly 5,000 missionaries to 34 different fields, and it all began with five young men praying in a haystack.

"First Day"



- Travel to New Orleans to help residents clean up their devastated homes - trips will take place in November, January, and April. (Outreach might be able to sponsor your trip.)



The families for the most part find it difficult to articulate adequately the way they feel... but they do feel the disruption to their lives and the uncertainty they face. It is so difficult.

The involvement of the volunteers from the North American Martyr's Church, St. Joseph's Church, St. Thomas Episcopal Church and the First Congregational Church is an ecumenical collaborative at it's very best.

At program start, six families were scheduled to participate. By Sunday, one family moved into their new apartment and one family had made housing arrangements elsewhere. We welcomed four families which consisted of four adults and six children ranging from 13 years old to 6 month old twins.

Diapers, Linus blankets, snacks, wonderful meals, one on one playtime, rocking chair time and many conversations --- what a lively week this has been.
